

If you think you are eligible for free school meals visit the Hounslow website https://www.hounslow.gov.uk/info/20025/schools_and_colleges/61/free_school_meals Families who are in receipt of free school meals currently receive £15 vouchers per child per week during the school holidays.

Attendance—Did you Know that ...

97% attendance means your child will have missed 6 days of school throughout the year.

If you take a two week holiday during term time your child's attendance will automatically be reduced to less than 95%.

90% attendance means that your child will have been absent for the equivalent of one half day every week! This also means that your child will have missed the equivalent of 4 whole weeks throughout the school year!

A two week holiday each year in primary school means a total of 14 weeks teaching time missed. This is the equivalent of a whole term and can have a real impact on your child's literacy and numeracy skills.

If your child does not attend school regularly and you fail to work with the school and The Education Welfare officer you may be fined up to £2,500.

Nursery Admissions

If your child was born between **1 September 2019** and **31 August 2020** they can start in our nursery class in September 2023. Please note we offer places for 15 hours either Morning (8.30am - 11.30am) or Afternoon (12.30pm - 3.30pm). 
