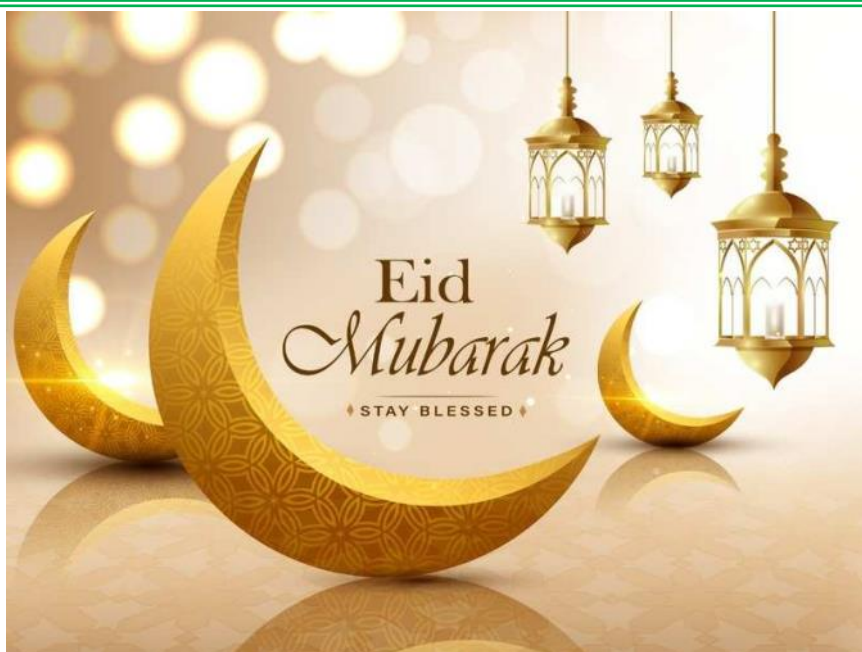

MAKE AN INSECT HOME



Earth Day 2023, taking place on Saturday 22 April, encourages us all to 'invest in our planet'.

With trees and hedgerows growing in school grounds across the UK, this fun activity helps you to 'invest in our planet' by creating an insect home.

This will encourage insects to make your trees and hedgerow their home and will be the perfect place for them to **hibernate** over winter.

Insects need homes now more than ever! The UK flying insect population has declined by as much as 60% in the past 20 years. 41% of insect species are threatened with extinction.

You're supporting an important **ecosystem** and being a force for nature!

MAKE AN INSECT HOME

PREPARATION



STEP 1: Find the right location for an insect home. Insects like damp, sheltered, cool homes where they won't be disturbed. Under a hedgerow could provide a lovely peaceful spot.

STEP 2: Consider your design. You can be as creative and ambitious as you like but remember you will need to find the materials (see step 3). We have included some pictures to inspire you on page 3.

STEP 3: Gather the materials for your insect home. Natural materials and recycled materials make this completely free. Here are some ideas:

The structure

- wooden pallets
- bricks
- untreated wood
- poster tubes

The cosy interiors

- hollow canes
- dried leaves
- cardboard
- rocks and stones
- twigs and pine cones
- hay and straw

STEP 4: Get any tools you might need. This could include: gardening gloves, secateurs, a tenon saw, scissors

INSPIRATION



CANE HABITATS



Hollow garden canes are excellent homes for solitary bees.

They can be bound with twine or stuffed within a re-used plastic bottle to hold them together.

These can be stacked under a hedgerow or hung from a tree.

Use an old plant pot laid on its side.

The cosy ingredients can then be layered within it to create a home for a range of different insects. This example contains garden canes, rocks and large stones and dead leaves.

This can be added to and they can be stacked together to build a larger home.

Larger-scale home can be created using bricks, old wood and pallets. They can be as small or as large as you like.

Canes, dead leaves, rolls of corrugated cardboard, wood with holes drilled in and rocks can be used to fill the voids in the structure.

Loud siren-like sounds will be triggered on mobile phones and other devices on 23rd April as part of a UK Government test of its new emergency alerts system. The service will broadcast alarms and send emergency advice to people's devices to warn them of nearby danger that could threaten their life such as a large fire or flooding. As part of the service's roll out, a number of trials are taking place.
