

In the news this week

It has been suggested that the number of hazel dormice in the UK has dropped from around 3.5 million to only 750,000 in almost 30 years. Currently, their conservation status is classed as 'vulnerable', but some researchers say people should be more worried for them. A recent report from the University of Exeter urges for hazel dormice to be reclassified as 'endangered' and calls for more conservation action.

SAY **NO** TO VAPING



DANGERS OF VAPING

We would like to draw your attention to the issues of vaping amongst young people. Rising numbers of children across the country have reported experimenting with vapes, which poses a risk to their health and development.

This week, children in KS1 and KS2 had an assembly focussed on the dangers and effects of vaping. This was delivered age appropriately by the class teacher, where children had opportunities to ask questions and discuss anything they were concerned about.

WHAT ARE E-CIGARETTES OR VAPE PENS?

- They are electronic devices that heat a liquid and produce an aerosol or mix of small particles in the air.
- They contain nicotine, which is highly addictive and can harm developing brains.
- They come in many shapes and sizes and can be difficult to identify as they are designed to look like pens, toys, cosmetics, lighters or perfume.
- Most have a battery, a heating element, and a place to hold a liquid.
- Vapes are extremely easy to conceal in pockets and hands.
- They are not suitable for children and are illegal to sell to anyone under the age of 18.



HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILD IS VAPING?

- You notice a sweet smell – e-liquids come in thousands of flavours.
- They are spending more money than usual.
- You find pods/cartridges or other unusual devices (e.g. a new USB drive).
- They are irritable, which can be a sign of withdrawal or cravings.
- They have new or increased coughing, sore throat, difficulty breathing, nausea.
- They experience more or sudden nosebleeds.
- They are thirsty – nicotine can make you dehydrated.



WHAT CAN I DO?

- Educate yourself. Know the facts about vaping and what e-cigarettes or vapes look like.
- Be a positive role model by staying smoke-free.
- Speak with other parents, school staff, your child's doctor and other trusted adults to create a community of support and increase awareness about the risks of vaping.
- Be aware of your child's online activity. The e-cigarette industry is targeting young people through social media and other popular sites.
